### Great-Grandson of Philippine WWII Hero Torch Passes to Next Vicente Lim

W ith his booming voice, Rev. Kenneth Fuller told me, "I fought on these very grounds!" They are words I will never forget for the rest of my life.

It was 2011 when my grandfather and I met Rev. Fuller on the way to the parking lot after attending the Memorial Day ceremonies at the Manila American Cemetery. He asked me if I was in the service and I said, "No, but he was..." pointing to my grandfather, Vicente Lim Jr. Both in wheelchairs, they gave each other sharp salutes, probably as sharp as they would have been if they had met 70 years earlier.

I went on to say, "He was a graduate of West Point, sir," to which Rev. Fuller replied, again with his booming voice, "West Point! Well that really deserves a salute!" My grandfather just smiled, as he was quite tired after the ceremonies that day, but I spoke on his behalf saying, "Well Rev. Fuller, you deserve a salute too, for all you've done!"

The reverend went on to tell us that he and his buddies in the 11<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division fought on the very ground on which the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial now stands. It is a story which has made me cherish my visits to the cemetery

### Veteran Joins Son in Retracing Father's Philippines Footsteps

n May 24, 2012, I began a tour of the Philippines with other AWONers to participate in the Memorial Day ceremony at the Manila American Cemetery, and to visit World War II conflict sites in Manila, Corregidor and the Bataan Peninsula. Join-

ing me after the AWON tour was Charles "Edwin" Dyer who served with my father in the 108<sup>th</sup> Regimental Combat Team (RCT).

Edwin and I began our journey at Mindanao, tracing the major route Edwin and my father took during part of the liberation of Northern Mindanao from the Japa-

nese occupiers. Edwin called this journey, "I came, I saw, I remembered."

My Father, PFC Ralph C. Pinkerton, was 26 and one of the older men in the 108<sup>th</sup>. He was a native Texan from Newcastle with only eight years of education. Raised in north central Texas during the Depression, Ralph was a truck driver and a laborer and later a riveter building B-24 Liberators. He was married with two children: Jerry Wayne, age 4, and Judy Carolyn, age 1, when he was drafted in 1944.

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Following basic training at Camp Wolters, Texas, he was sent to California. In February 1945 he shipped overseas on a Liberty Ship, the *USS Sea Snipe*, and arrived at the Replacement Depot on Leyte in early March. There, Ralph was assigned to the 4<sup>th</sup> Platoon, I Company, of the 108<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment as a .30-caliber machine gun

crew leader. From March until early May 1945, the 108<sup>th</sup> was involved in mopping up operations on the west side of Leyte. The regiment landed in Northern Mindanao on May 10. My father was killed in action on June 14, 1945.

After landing, I Company immediately began to move south from Macjalar Bay, generally along the Sayre Highway route to the Del Monte Plantation. Highway is a generous name since it was little more than a dirt road. Edwin and I were driven along the current Sayre Highway which is paved to some degree but generally is poorly maintained and remains a subpar highway.

A few days after landing, the 108<sup>th</sup> liberated the Del Monte Airfield, from which Gen. Douglas MacArthur and his party flew from Mindanao to Australia following their escape from Corregidor by Patrol Torpedo (PT) boat.

We visited the memorial at the site of the PT boat landing in Cagayan De Oro and the historical marker at the site of the Del Monte Airfield.

After securing the airfield, the 108<sup>th</sup> then proceeded south generally along the Sayre Highway to Mangima Canyon, which was heavily defended by the

Japanese. The Sayre Highway has several switchbacks before reaching the bottom of the canyon where the river rushes through. The terrain is highly mountainous with steep walls. The Japanese had dug caves and created excellent defensive positions across the river. A battle ensued that for several days kept the 108<sup>th</sup> from crossing the Mangima River at the bottom of the canyon. During the night before the crossing was completed, the

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### Home Front, Death Through Generations, Topics at AWON Indianapolis Conference

AWON is honored to have two highly respected scholars as keynote speakers at next month's National Conference in Indianapolis.

Dr. William Tuttle is Professor Emeritus of American Studies at the University of Kansas. He will speak about the American Home Front during World War II.

Dr. Vamik Volkan is an emeritus professor of psychiatry at the University of Virginia School of Medicine. He will talk about his ongoing study on transgenerational influence - how the death of fathers in World War II not only affected their children but also future generations.

Both presenters have impecable credentials: researching and publishing numerous works, continuing to present fresh perspectives to their peers, and receiving a few awards and recognitions along the way.

Dr. Tuttle has authored co-authored numerand ous books on World War II including World War II and the American Home Front (2004) and Daddy's Gone to War: The Second World War in the Lives of America's Children (1993), which was named a Notable Book of the Year by the New York Times and nominated for the Pulitzer Prize. His works concentrate on social and political history, in particular African-American history and the history of childhood.

Dr. Volkan has been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize four times for his work examining conflicts between opposing large groups, for carrying out projects in trouble-spots around the world for 30 years, and for his psycho-political theories.

He was an inaugural Yitzak Rabin Fellow at the Rabin Center for Israeli Studies in Tel Aviv, Israel; a Visiting Professor of Law at Harvard University; a Visiting Professor of Political Science at the University of Vienna in Austria; and a Visiting Professor of Political Psychology at Bahçeşehir University in Istanbul, Turkey. He chaired the Select Advisory Commission to the Federal of Investigation's Bureau Critical Incident Response Group. He received the Sigmund Freud Award from the city of Vienna in collaboration with the World Council of Psychotherapy, and has authored or co-authored more than 40 books. He has spoken to AWON previously about war's psychological effects on family and children, especially orphans. He is married to AWON orphan Betty Palonen Volkan.

AWON will mark its 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary at the 2012 National Conference. The Conference runs from Oct. 19-21. See registration form at left.


### Not Just Orphans Finding AWONer Stories on Internet Father Tribute Comes Back to Daughter

sat at my computer this morning, crying. Sob-L bing, really. It is not something I do a lot of, though I sometimes cry when I get emails sent by well-meaning friends showing children being surprised and embraced by their fathers returning from Iraq or Afghanistan. I am not sure if it is because I am so happy for the children that their dads made it home, or if I am once again feeling sorry for myself because my dad did not. Today, it wasn't an email. Today, it was Facebook.

More than a year ago I purchased two bricks at the National WWII Museum in New Orleans to honor my dad. I had hoped that they would be in place when I visited at the end of September last year. I was scheduled to give a speech to the remaining members of my dad's unit, the 315th Bomb Wing, at their annual reunion. Unfortunately it took quite a bit longer so the bricks finally were placed on a walkway outside the museum this May. I requested pictures of the bricks when they were offered to me by the museum. When they arrived, I sent them off to family members via email.

And so, as I said, I sat at my computer this morning, crying. Sobbing, really. When I opened my *Facebook* page there was a picture of the bricks. My granddaughter, Robyn, had posted it on *Facebook*. Beneath the picture she wrote, "This is my great-grandfather's brick at the WWII Museum in New

Orleans." Even that didn't set me crying; I was just so proud that she had been thoughtful enough to have done that. What set me crying was something a friend of hers wrote:

"This might sound weird, but here is a really neat site on him we found a while back when doing some research for my son's Young Marine group." She included the information on the site that turned out to be the Father Tribute I posted on the AWON website.

She continued: "The name sounded so familiar and I remembered that I had tagged it under my favorites."

Along with the website information was the picture I had posted of him with my story. It is my favorite picture of him. His shoulders are wrapped in a string bullets and his arms are holding an automatic weapon. He is wearing a leather bomber jacket and helmet. Huge goggles are wrapped around the top of the helmet. At the time that this woman found the AWON website, she did not know that he was my granddaughter's greatgrandfather.

It honestly never occurred to me that anyone other than a brother or sister war orphan would read his story. I have read them all. But to learn that someone unconnected, someone very young, would have an interest in the war, and in turn learn about my dad because of my story about him, well, this was more than I could handle this morning. This is why I was sobbing.



and the Memorial Day ceremonies there all the more.

To the American people, Memorial Day is just as important a holiday as Araw ng Kagitingan is to Filipinos. It is celebrated in commemoration of all those who have died while in the military service. This year's observance of Memorial Day has had the most meaning and significance to me than any other for a number of reasons.

This year marks the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Fall of Bataan. Such a milestone has made

me look back with even greater appreciation for what the defenders of Bataan and Corregidor had sacrificed for our freedom. But it has also made me look ahead to the challenge of keeping the spirit of Bataan and Corregidor alive for years and generations to come.

This year's Memorial Day ceremony also was made special by the presence of a contingent from the American World War II Orphans Network (AWON), an organization that the

Lim family has represented over the past few years in presenting a wreath for the honored dead. To finally meet the members of AWON was bittersweet, though. I finally got the opportunity to tell them personally that it has been such an honor for our family to be representing an organization like theirs. In meeting them, however, I really felt the absence of my grandfather, who has grown too weak to attend ceremonies such as this. In previous years, he would act as the official representative from the Lim family, with me as his proud escort in laying the AWON wreath. I was looking forward to my grandfather meeting the people from AWON, but it was not to be. For my father and I, it was yet another reminder that the responsibility that comes with being a Vicente Lim truly falls squarely on our shoulders now.

As with any visit I've made to the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial, its condition for the Memorial Day affair was nothing short of resplendent. Keeping the memorial the way it is requires a certain amount of dedication and passion for the job, and there seems to be no shortage of that among the staff as lead by Supt. Larry Adkison and Asst. Supt. Hubert "Bert" Caloud. Bert has become a good personal friend and is some-

one I have learned so much from. As I've told Bert previously, the passion with which he does his work is evident, and is something I draw inspiration from, especially when it comes to doing my part in perpetuating the memory of Gen. Vicente Lim and the men of the 41<sup>st</sup> Division.

Needless to say, I was quite thrilled when Bert invited me to join the flag planting activity the day before the ceremonies. It made me feel that I was directly part of something significant and

meaningful, and I was happy to share the experience with two of my younger cousins, their mother and a loyal high school friend of mine. We were among veterans, soldiers and families who all came out to help plant more than 34,000 Filipino and American flags in front of each headstone in the cemetery. I felt proud knowing I helped prepare the memorial, and that we had all paid such a wonderful tribute to all the heroes buried there.

The ceremony itself was beautiful, as always. Colorful wreaths from various donors and organizations lined the area in front of the central chapel. Despite the heat, I saw more people in attendance than I remember

seeing in previous Memorial Day affairs. While the U.S. Ambassador to the Philippines was unable to attend this year, the message of his representative, Leslie Bassett, Charge d'Affaires of the U.S. Embassy, was no less inspiring and insightful. The same could be said about the other speeches. Rev. Fuller's voice, as always, stood above the rest as he gave another moving invocation and memorial prayer. The sounds of the 21-gun salute and the ever-poignant "Taps" echoed throughout the silent cemetery. And, as it has on every occasion I've witnessed it, I was moved when one Filipino and one American child presented a bouquet of flowers for the fallen, and together uttered the words, "We will never forget."

After the ceremonies, I had the opportunity to finally speak with the people I have "met" online because of, and through, the Brigadier General Vicente Lim web page. One of those acquaintances was Robert Hudson, the son of a "Battling Bastard of Bataan," whose father was a soldier in the 31st Infantry Regiment. He's a Bataan researcher, and decided to move to the Philippines after falling in love with a Filipina during a tour he took of some Philippine World War II battlefields. I also met Marcia Kwiecinski, the better half of the Steve and Marcia on the Rock tandem, who have been living on Corregidor Island for the ultimate historians' immersion. Of course, I wouldn't have forgiven myself if I didn't set aside enough time to meet and talk to Patty Temte and the rest of the AWON contingent. Her father, Sgt. Ernest G. Radcliff, took off on a plane that got lost between the Philippines and Peleliu. He is memorialized in the Tablets of the Missing at the Manila American Cemetery, along with other AWON fathers.

I could not tell Patty enough how happy I was to finally meet them. I introduced them to the rest of the Lim family in attendance. I also thanked them for the kind gesture of including Lolo Vicente's name on the list of AWON fathers that they attached to their wreath. War makes orphans of us all in some way or form, so as I told Patty recently, it is comforting to know that there are people out there who are as passionate as I am when it comes to honoring the memory of those who have given their lives for their country.

As Patty and I said our goodbyes to each other, she got a bit choked up as she told me, "When I see you out here doing all this to honor all of them, I feel so happy and proud. I'm not sure I'll ever be able to come out here again because we're all getting old, but to see you and your beautiful family here to represent all of us, it really is so good." I told her that it was such an honor to stand in for AWON year after year, and that we will gladly and proudly do so for many years to come.

There was still so much to say, so many stories to exchange, and so much work left to be done for all the honored dead, but the day had to end. This time, there would be no salutes between Rev. Fuller and my grandfather, nor any interesting chats between Lolo and Bert. As we walked through the Tablets of the Missing to visit the panel where Brig. Gen. Vicente Lim is memorialized, I reflected upon the times I walked proudly beside Vicente Jr. in those halls. While it is sad to think that my grandfather and I will probably never walk those halls together again, I find comfort in knowing that, when the torch passes on to me and my father, as it probably has already, we will be ready and proud to answer the call.

Editor's Note: Vicente Lim Jr., grandfather of the writer, passed away on June 26, 2012, at the age of 89. He was the son of Brig. Gen. Vicente Lim, the first Filipino graduate of West Point, commander of the 41<sup>st</sup> Philippine Division, and survivor of the Bataan Death March. In the hospital, pretending to



be sick, he conducted secret guerilla activities. He was later captured and brutally killed by the Japanese while attempting to rejoin American forces in Australia.

Japanese executed a speedy withdrawal to avoid being encircled by American forces.

After crossing the river and securing the canyon – which the 108<sup>th</sup> dubbed "Purple Heart Canyon" due to heavy casualties taken there – the Americans proceeded to follow the retreating Japanese south toward Malaybalay. A few kilometers north of Malaybalay the 108<sup>th</sup> met the oncoming American forces coming north on the Sayre High-

way — the entire length of the Sayre Highway was in American control. Losing access to land supply routes after the Americans took control of the seas and air, the Japanese retreated into the mountains east of Malaybalay as their last option.

In 1997, a group of men who served with the 108<sup>th</sup> on Mindanao placed a plaque honoring members of the unit who died in the liberation of Northern Mindanao. Edwin and I visited that marker in Rotary Park in Malaybalay. My father's name is listed on the plaque. The marker has not been well maintained so I paid the Barangay Captain (the executive head of the smallest unit of government in the Philippines) whose office is across the street

from the park the requested amount to have it cleaned up. While in Malaybalay we were welcomed by the vice-mayor who left a council meeting to greet us.

After a few days' rest, elements of the 108<sup>th</sup> were sent into the mountains to the east of Malaybalay with the mission to seek out and neutralize the remaining Japanese forces in the area. On June 14, 1945, my father was killed near Cabanglasan and Bubonawan

River during that mission. We were driven to the village of Cabanglasan. On the way there we crossed the Bobonawan River, which is the area in which my father was killed.

The following is the Bronze Star Citation accompanying his award of the medal:

On 14 June 1945, the mission of "I" Company was to contact and reconnoiter enemy strongpoints along a jungle trail near Cabanglasan, Mindanao, P.I.

> Contact was made with the enemy approximately 50 to 75 yards to the front and flanks. The squad's mission was to protect the flank on the right of the company and the withdrawal of forward elements. In exchanging rounds with an entrenched enemy machine gun, Private First Class Pinkerton was wounded and later killed. Although wounded, Private First Class Pinkerton continued to stay by his machine gun and it was estimated that his gun killed two Japanese and greatly assisted in silencing the enemy position. Private First Class Pinkerton's perseverance and utter disregard for his personal safety contributed greatly to the success and completion of the mission.

While in Cabanglasan we were welcomed by the vice-mayor and municipal council. We explained we were retracing the steps of Edwin Dyer and Ralph Pinkerton who were two of the American soldiers who liberated the area from the Japanese in 1945. None of the council members had previously met an American Liberator. We were honored to meet them and respond to their questions.

### JPAC ID's 9 WWII MIAs in 2012 To Date

So far this year, the Department of Defense POW/Missing Personnel Office (DPMO) has located, identified and returned to their families the remains of nine World War II missing servicemen.

2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Emil T. Wasilewski, 22, of Chicago, was flying on a B-17 with eight other crew members when it crashed near Neustaedt-on-the-Werra, Germany. Only one crewmember successfully parachuted out of the aircraft. The remaining eight were buried by German forces.

After the war, U.S. Army Graves Registration personnel attempted to recover the remains of the eight men, but were only able to move the remains of one to a U.S. military cemetery in Holland. By 1953, with access to eastern Germany restricted by the Soviet Union, the remains of the seven remaining unaccounted-for crewmen were declared non-recoverable.

In 1991, a German national digging a grave in the Neustaedt cemetery discovered a metal U.S. military identification tag and notified officials. German burial law restricted further site investigation until 2007, when the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC) surveyed the area. In 2008, the site was excavated and the team recovered human remains and military equipment.

Scientists from JPAC and the Armed Forces DNA Identification Laboratory used Y chromosome DNA matching Wasilewski's nephew, and other forensic tools, in the identification of his remains.

2nd Lt. Charles R. Moritz, 21, of Effingham, IL, was piloting a P-51C Mustang in June 1944 when it collided with another plane while on a training flight over Lincolnshire, England. Witnesses reported seeing the aircraft crash however officials were not able to recover Moritz's remains.

In 2011, vintage aircraft enthusiasts found the plane and pilot's remains 18 feet under ground. Investigators found human remains, military identification tags bearing Moritz's name, a bracelet with the pilot's name and a wallet containing several cards bearing Moritz's name.

In September 1944, Pfc. Gerald W. Kight, 23, of White Salmon, WA, was dropped in the vicinity of Nijmegen, Netherlands, as part of Operation Market Garden. Kight was manning a machine gun position near the town of Groesbeek when he was overrun by German forces.

In September 2011, the

Royal Netherlands Army's Recovery and Identification Unit recovered human remains from a wartime foxhole in a cornfield northeast of Groesbeek. Along with remains were military uniform fragments and three military identification tags which bore the name and home address of Kight and his mother.

The other World War II MIAs recovered so far in 2012 are: 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. Laverne A. Lallathin, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Dwight D. Ekstam, 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. Walter B. Vincent Jr., Tech. Sgt. James A. Sisney, Cpl. Wayne R. Erickson, Cpl. John D. Yeager, and Pfc. John A. Donovan, all U.S. Marine Corps, who were lost when their PBJ-1 crashed over the island of Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides (now Vanuatu); Navy Radioman 1<sup>st</sup> Class Harry C. Scribner of Seattle who also crashed on Espiritu Santo; and Army Air Forces 1<sup>st</sup> Lt. Warren G. Moxley of Charleston, MO, who crashed near Asbach, Germany.
