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WP-ORG Thanks AWON for Continued Support

Every year, AWON budgets money to donate to West-Point.Org. West-Point. Org is the non-profit organization that provides email listserv services to dozens of military organizations, including AWON.

Even though they are nonprofit, they have expenses. They purchase and maintain computers and servers, electricity, and a technical staff. Many volunteers keep expenses low.

Twice a year West-Point. Org conducts a fund drive on their hosted listservs to cover their operating expenses for the coming six months. Once they reach their goal they stop fundraising.

Because they host the AWON ListServ, and a significant portion of the AWON website, AWON contributes \$350 annually to West-Point.Org. Their services would cost a great deal

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more than the \$350 AWON donated this year if AWON had to buy them elsewhere.

Pay Attention to Address Label, e-Star Email Alerts

AWON Database Manager Gerry Morenski wishes to remind members to look at the address label on their newsletters, or to read the complete email message if they receive the *e-Star*, for their membership status and renewal date.


The date a member's dues expires appears on the newsletter mailing label just above the member's name (see gray box to the right). If the member's dues have lapsed, the line above the name will have the date the dues ran out. For example, the line might read **Exp:12/30/2012**.

Members who elected to receive their newsletter by email will not have an address label. Instead, the email they receive announcing the latest newsletter is available on the website for viewing and downloading will contain the date their dues expire.

If you do not receive a newsletter, please inform Gerry or *The Star* Editor Kathy Le Comte as soon as possible. It is possible the issue wasn't delivered because you moved or because your address is incomplete. The U.S. Postal Service has instituted several measures to cut down on undeliverable mail. If your name or address has changed your AWON mail could be returned to AWON

or be lost. AWON can send a replacement issue.

Sometimes members forget that they signed up for the e-Star. If they sign up for the e-Star they will not receive a hard copy of



the newsletter in the mail. They must watch for the email notification that the e-Star is posted on the AWON website. If a member wishes to have the hardcopy instead, contact Gerry and she can make the change.

Hardcopies of the newsletter can take several weeks to be delivered by the post office. The date the newsletter is put in the mail is announced on the AWON ListServ. Generally, *The Star* is mailed around the last week of February, May, August, and November.

AWONers Research, Present Heroic Story at 35ID Reunion

Several AWON members attended the 95th reunion of the 35th Infantry Division Association, September 6-8, 2012, in Kansas City, Missouri.

Orphans of the "Santa Fe" Division attending were Maggie Fenstermacher, Pat Rowe Cook, Shirley Theis, Victoria Frisenda, Paula Baker, Marilyn Jensen and Neal Thomsen.

The eighth attendee, Ben Weber, is the nephew of Maj. Gen. Edmund B. Sebree, assistant commander of the 35ID. His *Task Force Sebree* liberated the city of Nancy, France. Ben is a member of

AWON because his cousin, 2nd Lt. Zean G. Gassman Jr., a P-51 pilot, is MIA.

Spouses attending were Bill Baker, Curtis Cook, Sherry Weber and Doris Thomsen.

The AWON members of the 35ID worked together to create a presentation about one of the 35ID's heroic events. Twelve volunteers from the 134th Regiment rescued 81 small children from a school under bombardment. The story of the "Baby Patrol" was circulated nationwide by the Associated Press, and appeared in *Time* magazine on September 29, 1944, but it was omitted from the Division history books and regimental journal. Pat introduced the presentation by Shirley, Paula and Ben. Marilyn organized the PowerPoint and presented a video tribute to the

U.S. Soldier Finds Missing Fighter Pilot

The family of an American World War II fighter pilot, missing in action for 60 years, can thank a hobby archaeologist soldier and the German pilot who shot him down for bringing his story to print.

Roscoe Red Three is Missing is the extensively detailed, six-year saga of the discovery and recovery of the remains of 1st Lt. Paul W. Mazal, a P-47 Thunderbolt pilot with the 406th Fighter Group, 513th Fighter Squadron, based in England. The 22-year-old Mazal was shot down and killed by an antiaircraft gun manned by a German pilot and his mechanic on March 19, 1945, during an attack on a German airfield. Sixty years later, on August 27, 2005, his remains were recovered by a team of civilian aviation archaeologists led by author Danny I.P. Keay.

Keay is the founder of Missing Aviator Research/Recovery Team. Since 2004, he has been involved in the recovery of nine missing aviators, including Mazal, and more than 30 crash sites. Of late Keay is researching the missing soldiers of the 84th and 102nd Infantry Divisions, killed during the Battle for Geilenkirchen, Germany, where he resides when not stationed in the states as a military intelligence specialist in the U.S. Army.

Keay's team of English, American and Germans were able to solve the 60year-old Mazal mystery in less than five hours, but the book didn't coming along as fast.

ROSCOE RED THREE DANNY I. P. NEAY b u t m v e r y detailoriented, and in a lot of cases it took me six years to get that data," Keay explained in a May 2012 interview with the Fort Campbell Courier. "If I couldn't find a certain answer, I just stopped writing for a while.

"The German pilot that shot down Lieutenant Mazal

- I've been in contact with him for a few years - contacted me and he goes, 'Danny, when's this book coming out that you promised me two years ago? I don't know how much longer I've got. I want to read this book.' And so that was the push to finish it. It was actually the guy that shot him down who was the motivator to finish the book."

Keay describes not only Mazal's last day, but also explores the shoot-down from both the American and German perspectives, the recovery efforts, the identification process, the return of Mazal's remains to his family, his unit's last reunion, and the memorial service for Mazal.

Friday • October 19, 2012

The conference got underway at 1 p.m. with an official welcome by conference cochairs Walt Linne and Barb Francis Kelly. They read proclamations from the mayor of Indianapolis and the governor of Indiana.

AWON Board President Ed Peters then welcomed members, with a special welcome to our "First Timers." Ed then introduced AWON Founder Ann Mix, who was presented a corsage. Ann shared how AWON came to be and introduced her daughters, Serena Bennington Worthington and Cydney Michelle Payton.

Our emcee was Sam Tannenbaum. He welcomed all and introduced Judy Hathaway, First Timers and Sharing Circles hostess; and Rondy Elliott, who talked about her new book, *Unmistakable Beams of Light*. Judi Kramer then talked about her AWON quilt, which members can write their father's name on, and the AWON raffle. At the beginning of the conference the quilt had 295 names on it - with more names being added this weekend.

Lorin McCleary shared his role in the early days of AWON and how the AWON logo came to be. He mentioned all the First Founders and how they each donated \$500 to get AWON started. Letters were read from First Founders Ann Black and Susan Hadler who could not be in attendance.

At 2 p.m. Dr. Vamik Volkan began his presentation on Transgenerational Influence. We learned how the problems our mothers faced were passed on to us orphans and even our grandchildren. Helping Dr. Volkan with his program was a panel consisting of orphans Barry Barr-Finch, Sue Perko and Rondy Elliott, and grandson and First Timer Keith Vernon. Each of them related how they grew up, then Dr. Volkan commented on the effect of transgenerational influence

in their story.

Following the Volkan presentation we had Sharing Circles, where orphans gather in small groups to talk. Orphans were grouped by branch of service or theater of war, while spouses and family went to another Sharing Circle.

After a break we gathered for the evening reception and dance. The room was decorated with blue and gold star balloons. The snack table had tall gold glitter candle decorations. Walt cut the 20th anniversary cake and everyone danced to the music of *The Rhythmaires*.

Hopefully you feel like you were with us in thought, and know that we are thinking of you and your fathers, also.

Saturday • October 20, 2012

Board Director Norma Nicol Hamilton started our day with a very informative presentation on AWON archiving. Norma has researched and attended Society of American Archivists conferences to learn how to plan for the future deposition of the AWON Archives.

In 2011, an inventory was started of AWON materials, including board meeting minutes, financial records, *STAR* newsletters, AWON database, AWON website, books written by AWON members, newspaper articles printed in local newspapers, and the AWON quilt. Ann Whalen O'Connor maintains the AWON Archives. If you have any articles about your father or AWON published in your local newspaper, be sure to send an original copy to Ann.

Just as AWON turns its thoughts to the future, Norma encouraged us all to think ahead, and be deciding what we want to happen to our personal collections of our father's records and memorabilia. Leave specific directions to whomever will be handling your estate some day.

Our main speaker was Dr. William Tuttle, who spoke about children and the homefront - the subject of his award-winning book. He spoke informatively through his research, as well as his personal experiences. He signed copies of his book afterward.

Next, we screened two incredible videos. The first was First Timer Maxine Graham Olson's *Finding Fathers* video, honoring her father, 2LT Max Kenneth Graham. It had an interview with Ann Mix and a segment by Harry Strahlendorf, honoring his father. The second video was *The Last Flight of Lieutenant Estill*. It had awesome footage of the search of Sharon Estill Taylor's father's P-38 that went down 60 years before his plane was located, and his remains found and identified by JPAC. It ended with his burial at Arlington National Cemetery.

After the screenings we again met for Sharing Circles. It's a very emotional time for some, because they have never had anyone to talk to about their father. But orphans listen - and understand. Members ask advice on areas such as research ideas, obtaining their father's records, or how to arrange visits to overseas national cemeteries to go to their father's graves for the first time. Orphans learn what other orphans experienced growing up. It's a tremendous time of bonding and healing.

The evening was free to tour the city, eat with friends - or rest.

Sunday • October 21, 2012

We gathered at 9 a.m. on a sunny, Sunday morning and boarded busses to shuttle over to the Indiana War Memorial Museum. What a stately building! Directly across from it we could see the American Legion National Headquarters Building.

We were greeted by Executive Director Brig. Gen J. Stewart Goodwin, USAF (Ret), who led us into the Gen. John Pershing Auditorium. It was extremely ornate! We listened intently while he told us the history of the memorial and museum, built in the 1920's, at a cost of \$2.2 million. He was a great speaker: his facts flowed swiftly, with a keen sense of humor throughout. The auditorium has perfect acoustics, with rounded corners, cork material in the ceiling, and special acoustic material in the walls. It seats 500 in its original seats.

We then toured the Shrine Room and the museum areas, which display memorabilia from every war Indiana has participated in. One of thier most prized possessions is an American flag from the Battle of Gettysburg, full of bullet holes.

After the tour we enjoyed a catered lunch. The next order of business was the AWON business meeting. We were introduced to our board directors, and they explained what projects they chair. It was expressed more than once that this is a harmoniously-working board. A motion was made for the current officers to retain their positions.


Database Manager Gerry Morenski reported there are about 4,000 names in the AWON database. Our membership of 629 yields about 500 active members. Janice Buterbaugh mails First Inquiry packets to prospective orphans, and Judi Hollis Kramer sends welcome packets to new members. There was discussion about establishing a committee to explore the possibility of financial assistance for members who are unable to attend conferences.

Regional Coordinator Chair Barry Barr-Finch requested a volunteer to work with him. Barry notifies state volunteer regional coordinators around the country to contact new members in their states.

It was announced that the 2014 AWON National Conference will be held in Seattle, Washington; co-chaired by Barry Barr-Finch and Judi Hollis Kramer. There was talk that the 2016 Conference may be in Florida.

Back in the Pershing Auditorium for the AWON Memorial Service, we were surrounded by gold stars. It seemed like they put them there nearly 90 years ago just for us AWON orphans to visit all these years later. The ceiling had a huge circle of gold stars, as well as the walls. The auditorium is still used for military ceremonies, funerals, weddings, and viewing documentaries.

First was the presentation of the colors by the color guard, complete with the Pledge of Allegiance. AWON orphan, Pastor Louis Kunz, son of PFC Louis R. Kunz, led us in the invocation. Walt Linne read the moving poem, *High Flight*.

AWON grandchildren Ron Burrus, Kristie Clark, Mark LaPointe, Kathy Le Comte, Chuck LeGrand, Joey Tartell, and Keith Vernon, reverently read each of our fathers' names. As each father's name was read, that orphan lit their battery candle light. By the end, candles glowed all around the room, reflected in our tears. I get glory bumps just thinking about the next event on the agenda at the memorial. Mark LaPointe, grandson of Sgt. William G. Aubut, played his guitar and sang his original tribute, Somewhere in Germany. It was composed from lines from wartime letters written between his grandparents. Beside Mark, as he sang, was a framed portrait of his grandfather. His song, on CD, is available in the AWON Bookstore.

Our Memorial Service ended with *Taps* perfectly played by Joey Tartell, son of Judy Geis Hoffman and grandson of S/SGT Daniel R. Geis.

Many pictures were taken as we waited to board buses back to our hotel. Maybe the first-ever AWON group orphan pictures were taken on the steps. We looked like the paparazzi all lined up with our cameras!

And now for the last event of the day and the conference - our banquet. Time has passed much too quickly! This is such a bitter-sweet time. We're looking our best, but feeling the separation anxiety that is about to take place, when we say our goodbyes. It will be two years until our next conference.

We were greeted by Emcee Sam Tannen-baum, Board President Ed Peters, and Conference Chaplain Louis Kunz. Following a delicious meal, we met our honored guests: National American Legion Commander Jim Koutz, and his aide, Steve Short; and Indiana War Memorials Commission Executive Director Brig. Gen. Stewart Goodwin. They received beautiful AWON plaques of appreciation and monetary donations.

AWON Founder Ann Mix, STAR editor Kathy Le Comte, and Vice President and Database Manager Gerry Morenski, were recognized for their oustanding service to AWON.

The late Col. Jack Forgy's sister, Pamela Forgy Klein, shared stories about Jack before the Col. Jack Forgy Distinguished Service Award was presented to Walt Linne. Walt is an AWON First Founder, past president, AWON Bookstore manager, and 2012 Conference co-chair.

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Author Draws On Adult Reminisces of War Years

Home Front Life Leaves Mark on Children

have been asked to write a brief summary of the presentation given at the Indianapolis conference by our guest speaker, historian William M. Tuttle Jr., Ph.D.

Dr. Tuttle is Professor Emeritus of American Studies at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. As I also live in Lawrence, I knew of Dr. Tuttle and his book about children on the home front, "Daddy's Gone to War": The Second World War in the Lives of America's Children. Early in the 1990's, in preparation for his book, Dr. Tuttle solicited letters from men and women then in their fifties and sixties by writing to many of the largest newspapers across the United States. Those letters, as well as his own memories of being a child on the home front whose father had gone to war, formed the basis of his presentation. Of particular interest to this group, one of those who wrote Dr. Tuttle in the early 1990's was AWON founder, Ann Mix.

The war was a pervasive element in the everyday lives of children on the home front. Dr. Tuttle spoke of a girl's indelible memories of the December 7, 1941 attack, as witnessed from her family home on the naval base at Pearl Harbor. He recalled the impact of the media on America's children: the necessity for children to be quiet when gathered around the radio to hear news of the war; the graphic images provided by The Eyes and Ears of the World news reels at the neighborhood movie theaters; the war themes so prevalent in movies and even in cartoons and short subjects; the comic books and magazines, notably Life, with its photographs from the war. He spoke of "duck and cover" drills at school and of children participating in scrap drives. Many children recalled helping with the war effort by taking labels off empty cans, removing the ends, and flattening the cans by stomping on them. Families saved bacon grease. One boy contributed his most prized possession, a mechanical car, to the scrap drive. Children took pride in their patriotism and felt they were contributing to the war effort through these activities. Dr. Tuttle recalled participating in war games with children in his neighborhood.

Most poignant perhaps were the descriptions of children saying goodbye to fathers as they went off to war. Mothers and grandmothers became the mainstays on the home front, and there were many changes as women entered the workforce. Children worried about their fathers in far-off lands and wondered when or if they would return. Many felt that they had to protect their mothers, taking on adult roles while still in childhood. When, at last, most of the fathers returned from war, many were greatly changed by their wartime experiences. Dr. Tuttle shared his own story of his father's departure for war when Tuttle was only four years old, not to return until he was nearly eight.

Dr. Tuttle's research and publications have concentrated on social and political history, in particular African-American history and recent American society including the history of childhood. Dr. Tuttle is the author of several highly-acclaimed books, among them "Daddy's Gone to War": The Second World War in the Lives of America's Children, which was named a Notable Book of the Year by The New York Times and was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize in 1994. Of interest to many in AWON, Dr. Tuttle earned the United States Air Force Commendation Medal for Meritorious Service in 1962. Sgt. William G. Aubut was killed in action on 23 February 1945 just after crossing the Roer river near Selgarsdorf, Germany. His only child, Donna, was three years old. When his widow re-married out of financial necessity, her new husband insisted that she throw away all of Bill's things, including all the letters he had written home to her and Donna. She told her new husband she threw everything away, but she really didn't. She placed the letters in a shoe box and hid them in the attic, where they remained until 1980. As she lived out her final days at that home she shared her secret with Donna. Together one day they sat in her bed and read the entire contents of that shoebox. Reading the letters one evening, Mark put his grandfather's words to music. The title comes from the heading of the final letter Sgt. Aubut wrote home, on what turned out to be the day before his death.
