This is the story of my dad, Pfc James Marvin Bishop, who died April 24, 1945, near the Bavarian town of Tittling, and the pilgrimage I and my son Andrew made to the area during October and November of 2018.

My dad met my mother, Sarah Jane Engle, at a Christmas party somewhere in the Sand Valley area in December 1943. I suppose it was a sort of love at first sight situation, because they were married in April 1944. They were both working at the Benjamin Kohn Ribbon Mill in Attalla, Alabama - he parttime as he was a senior at Etowah High School.

He graduated in May, and his draft notice was received June, 1944. He reported to Fort McClellan, and was inducted into the US Army. He was then sent to Camp Crowder near Neosho, Missouri, for basic training in the Signal Corps. Mother traveled by train in September to visit him and they had only the weekend for their visit. She would see him for the last time when he was on leave at home in Attalla in early Jan 1945 before reporting to Fort George Meade in Washington D.C.

As we know from history, the German offensive of December 1944 was of great consternation to the US Army officials. Consequently, General Marshall and others decided that all available soldiers, regardless of their MOS, would be sent to the European Theater of Operations to serve as riflemen. Thus, my Dad would now be sent to the ETO.

We believe my father was sent to the ETO on a troop ship from Baltimore Harbor, February, 1945. He celebrated his 19th birthday on board ship. After arriving in England, he was assigned to a replacement depot to await orders. In one of his letters he mentions that England was a very pretty country, with many low rock walls...and the people talked funny!

Since I was born February 20, 1945, I of course never saw my father, nor he me. Although I had a few precious photographs, his and her letters to each other, and stories from my mother and grandparents, I naturally always felt a deep loss.

It was only in the early 1980s that I started to research Dad's situation, trying to find any information I could. All of his service records were destroyed in the fire at the US Army Records Center in St. Louis, MO in 1973. I did have my mother's letters and papers which did provide some direction. For instance, I had 2 letters, one from his captain, and another from his sergeant, in which they tried to tell my mother of her husband's death. Both indicated he was shot and was buried in a temporary grave by the side of a road, near a town by the name of Tittling, Germany.

Later I learned that the Army had other records, namely a record called "Finding of Death"(FOD). This is a record of any death of a soldier, prepared by the Graves Registration (GR) organization. The GR people follow after battles to locate the dead, and remove them to a central location for interment. The soldier's next of kin had the option to leave the remains in a US controlled Cemetery in Europe (or the Pacific), or to have the remains sent back to the US after the war was over.

It was this record, that led me to a most amazing odyssey and discovery.

In this FOD file was a map prepared by the GR, which showed that Pfc James Marvin Bishop's body was found at a location about one mile from the center of the town of Tittling. There was also a perfunctory examination of the remains, which showed "all bones broken, except left ulna" (This information is critical). The remains were identified by two dogtags.

Now I was somewhat confused. The letters from his Capt and SGT said that he was killed by sniper fire. But this report says that all his bones were broken except his left arm.

Of course, these days, the whole world is connected by the Internet, which makes doing research easier. About 15 years ago, when I first got the FOD file, I searched the Net and found that Tittling had a website! Of course it was in German, but I could determine the mailing address, so I sent the town mayor (Hr. Herbert Zauhar) a letter with which I enclosed a copy the FOD report, explained who I was and why I was writing, and asked him if he could possible verify the location as marked on the map.

Here is where the odyssey truly begins!

Hr. Zauhar not only verified the location as reported on the GR map, but he also sent several color photographs of the area, the house, and the man who lived in the house, a Mr. Krenn, who was a young lad at the time, and remembered my father's body being there. Hr. Zauhar also placed a wreath of flowers on the burial site. I was overwhelmed. Hr. Zauhar also sent many other photographs and information which he gathered. One of the items he sent me was a brochure about the town's years during the war, prepared by the town historian. It was titled, "Das Americanzes Commen".

Of course it was in German, which I cannot read or speak, but I asked a friend to translate it for me. He said that there was only one part of it that was of any consequence for me. It told of when the American army came to Tittling on April 24, 1945, an American soldier was riding on a tracked vehicle, was shot, fell off, and then was run over by another tracked vehicle, probably a tank.

Since it was verified by his unit after action reports that my Dad was the only American soldier killed that day in this town, his body was also identified by his dogtags, so I know for sure this is him.

With that, it became clear about the GR report that all bones were broken! He was run over after being killed. I know this is gruesome, but things like that sadly happen many times in war.

My friend Jack Franck, an infantry captain in Vietnam, told me no officer would ever write a wife or mother a letter detailing the exact cause of death. Thus, the intentionally vague statements in the letters from his captain and sergeant.

I mantained an email relationship with Hr. Zauhar in the years since, and had always wanted to visit the town. Early in 2019, my son Andrew and I started to plan a trip to Tittling.

We left Atlanta October 29, arriving in Munich on the 31st. We were met by Hr. Zauhar and his friend Guenther Hodl. We spent some time in Munich Center sightseeing, and then drove to Tittling, where Andrew and I were guests of Hr. Zauhar and his wife, Gertrude.

The next day, we traveled to Passau, a larger town about 20 miles away, and toured the town. We saw in a church the largest pipe organ in the world.

On Thursday, we were invited to a reception at the town hall, or as they call it in Germany, der Rathaus. The mayor and his staff were there, and several others who had some connection to my Dad.

It was heart-wrenching for me when I was introduced to Mrs. Gertrude Kalbus, whose grandfather was the town grave digger, and who moved my Dad's body from the field where he was killed, to a safer place by the side of the house of Mr. Krenn. Mr. Krenn (who died a few years prior) was a young boy at the time, and he remembered the body being placed there and covered with a tarp. Mrs. Kalbus, who was 6 years old at the time of my father's death, also said that she and some other children placed lilac blooms on the tarp. Later the GR people came and removed the body to be interred in the Nuremburg Cemetery.

Mrs. Kalbus gave me a small photograph of her grandfather. I will certainly treasure it.

Mrs. Kalbus also told me of a nephew of hers who was maybe 15, and the SS showed up at his house and told

him to come with them. He asked if he could see his mother one last time, but they refused his request. He was killed the next day.

Mrs. Hannelore Krenn gave me a spent German bullet that her husband found when he was repairing the roof of their house. Another keepsake (I am just glad it made it thru TSA and customs!)

Hr. Willmerdinger, the mayor, gave a short talk, welcoming Andrew and me to Tittling. I then made some remarks to the crowd. Mr. Johann Kargl did the translating for me.

I also met two people who also had fathers killed in the war. Mr. Xaver Munichdorf, whose father was killed, and Mrs. Katharina Holler, whose father was killed in Russia, and is buried in an unknown grave, when she was a year old.

Mr. Josef Krenn, chairman of the local veterans association was also there.

I also met Mr. Brienbauer whose father was a prisoner of war in Russia, and who did not make it back to his home until 1951! Also, this man's home (close by where my dad was killed) was burned down in the fighting around Tittling.

Hr Zauhar also took us to the very spot where my Dad was killed. It was an empty field about a half-acre, close by the house of Mr Krenn. This is in the small villiage of Hormannsdorf, just outside Tittling, about 1 mile. It is a farming area, both then and now.

The American Army was driving through Bavaria when my Dad's unit (21st Armored Infantry Battalion of the 11th Armored Division) passed through the Tittling area. So I have stood in the very area where he met his death, and also the spot where his body was

placed safely before the GR showed up 2 days later. The town placed a small shrine on the side of the road; a crucifix and some flowers, with his photograph.

I also placed a small wreath of flowers at the town's War Memorial. I did this not for any political reasons of my own, but from respect, to memorialize the people's loss of loved ones. The way I look it, when a person loses a loved one in the awfulness of war, they feel their loss just as much as anyone, regardless of the reasons for the war.

I cannot express how much all this has meant to me. It is simply awesome that the townspeople of Tittling would pay such respect to me and Andrew, the son and grandson of an American soldier who came to their town in a time of war, to help repel the evil of Nazism.

These words came to me after my odyssey:

Love and Kindess

But may I say that while all this has been of deep meaning to me personally, it is in the final anaylsis not about me, but it is about the more than 400,000 men and women who gave their last full measure of devotion in service to their country. In WWII, men and women left their homes and loved ones, and did not come home. Their loss is felt even today - by sons and daughters, brothers, sisters, and yes, even a few mothers and fathers who yet live today.

My prayer is that no war ever comes to our world again.

It appears that this rite will become an annual event on the third weekend each June."

From Vol 17, Summer 1999. *Widows May Be Eligible for Monthly Payments* - "Widows of veterans who remarried after their husbands' deaths but who are now single may be eligible for a VA compensation of at least \$861 per month. Eligible widow(er)s must now be single, and at some time in their lives have been widowed while married to a uniformed servicemember or veteran who died: while on active duty; as a result of a service-connected disability; or of non-service connected cause having 100 percent service-connected disability."

From Vol 18, Winter 1999. *5th Division Donation* "AWON received the following letter from the 35th Division Association - 'It is with pleasure that I am forwarding Check #1744 in the amount of \$1,000, a donation from the 35th Infantry Division Association.. There are no strings attached to this donation. We respect the fine track record AWON has established."" **From Vol 19, Spring 2000 -** "AWON's involvement with the grassroots fundraising campaign for the National WWII Memorial is making good progress, as reported by the American Battle Monument Commission. To date, more than 50 of our members are actively distributing brochures and spreading the word about this long overdue Memorial to honor our fathers and all who helped win the war. As of mid-March more than \$15,215 has been generated by AWON members. This puts us well into the 'Defender' level of participation and AWON will be recognized as a major contributor."



The Only One In The World

as told to Kristin Holmes by Gary Kinley

Private Frederick Kinley was affectionately called "Pappy" by his fellow soldiers because at the age of 37, he was much older than most of the men he served with, and was already a family man. A Pennsylvania native, he left his wife Blanche and his children - Lee, George (called Gary) and Sandra - when called to serve his country in Europe.

On December 12, 1944, Private Kinley, a bazooka sharpshooter, and his fellow troops from the 313th Infantry, 79th Division led an assault on the town of Seltz in the Alsace region of France. PVT Kinley and his fellow team members were sent across the remains of a ruined bridge by foot to set up a bridgehead to raise a pontoon bridge to allow tanks to enter the city. In the words of SSGT James Carter who witnessed the assault, "Enemy fire was very heavy, and it took great courage for these men to advance, but they never wavered."

PVT Kinley was hit by artillery fire and killed on December 14, but the assault was successful. The bridge was raised and the town of Seltz was secured. His family received word of his passing the day after Christmas.

Shortly before Kinley's death, the United States Army ran out of flags to lay on their soldiers' graves. The losses had been so heavy post-Normandy, that they had used up literally every flag they had. So in November of 1944, the Signal Corps charged a group of French flag makers (actually a small garment company who had taken on the job of flagmaking) with the task of producing more American flags - at that time with 48 stars - to be laid on the coffins of fallen soldiers.

But the French misunderstood the request. They thought they were making flags for Gold Star Mothers, and produced a first run of 500 flags not with white stars on both sides, but with white stars on one side and gold stars on the other. Rather than waste the flags, the Army used them, and one of these unusual flags was laid on the coffin of Private Fred Kinley.

Gary Kinley recalls going up to the attic beginning at the age of 6, not long after his father's death, and opening the family's cedar chest to read his parents' letters. The flag was there, but Gary didn't open it to take a look till he was much older.

Once he saw those gold stars, Gary began to investigate its origins. He contacted the Army, the Navy, and even the Smithsonian Institution in the search for more information. The Smithsonian claimed that the flag's existence was a rumor, but that they'd been looking for 20 years for corroboration of the story. The Kinley family's flag is believed to be the last surviving flag of the 500 originally made.

Gary Kinley still flies his family's flag on special days like his father's birthday. He has vowed that he'll never sell his flag, not for a million dollars. Just like his father Fred, it's the only one in the world - irreplaceable.




